As part of this learning partnership, I am looking forward to developing three bi-lingual endeavours, linking language and science collaboration projects for pupils in Year 4 & 6, and language immersion and conversation in the Senior School.

Having thoroughly enjoyed last night's talented performances from pupils across our Pre-Prep and throughout the Prep and Senior School in our Spring concerts, I am very much looking forward to next week's school production of Oliver. Thank you so very much to all those parents who attended and to our pupils for continuing to provide us with such excellence in pursuit of the creative and performing arts.

COLCHESTER ZOO STEM DESIGN PROJECT

For National Science Week, we have been taking part in the Colchester Zoo STEM design project where the children have to work collaboratively to design a new enclosure for the zoo.

The children spent time researching different animals, designing enclosures in various formats including using MineCraft, Lego, junk modelling and building blocks. The children had to think about how their enclosures would be suitable for the animals, the zoo staff and the zoo visitors.

This has sparked some lively discussions about different perspectives and inclusivity. It was a lovely opportunity to use our Science knowledge and skills across the curriculum. Wish us luck for our entries in the competition!

'HANDS ON SCIENCE' WORKSHOPS

On Wednesday, pupils also enjoyed some 'Hands on Science' workshops funded by the CHSA. Year 5 &6 had a workshop about Time, during which they had to work collaboratively to improve their teamwork based upon the slick tyre changing in F1. Year 3&4 had a workshop called 'Elastic Racers' during which they made racing vehicles and tested them out and Year 1&2 participated in a workshop about Rockets, looking at energy, forces and pressure as they designed paper rockets.

SENIOR SCIENCE WEEK





YEAR 9 UNIVERSITY SCIENCE TRIP

As part of British Science Week, CPHS have joined forces with the School of Life Sciences at Essex University to aid them in their project to investigate the cleanliness of the air in our local vicinity.

In order to broaden pupil's understanding of the topic and engage them in potentially pursuing a science-based degree course, we were invited to spend the day at the University working with PhD students to get a flavour of what life might be like studying a scientific degree course. The pupils looked at soil microbes and plant diversity, cancer genetics and molecular biochemistry.

After an input on bioaerosols and the surprising causes of other harmful particulate matter found in the air around us (e.g. flushing the toilet with the lid open, burning candles, not ventilating a room properly leading to CO2 build-up) the first challenge was to design and construct an air filtration system capable of effectively reducing the risk posed to our everyday health. All teams worked superbly well on this. Pupils could also then look at some biological sample slides using powerful light microscopes, and heard about technology used to sequence the bases in DNA strands for use in countless scientific applications such as evolutionary relationships or biomedical disease research.

The highlight of the trip for many was then the chance to use the impressive lab facilities of the department. Pupils conducted an experiment to extract the DNA from E.coli bacteria and were able to use new scientific techniques such as centrifuging samples to separate layers of cells, ultra-fine pipettes to measure tiny quantities of chemicals and to feel like a proper scientist in a white lab coat!

A STEAM quiz rounded off the day and University staff judged the scientific poster competition which teams of pupils had submitted based on an experimental write-up (photosynthesis in pond weed, the reactivity series of metals and Newton's second law of motion). They were thoroughly impressed with our pupil's efforts and several teams received special acknowledgement for their thorough and accurate work.

We were extremely grateful to the University of Essex for hosting us and to Mrs Rose for organising the trip, giving our pupil's the chance to experience real-life, science-based study, to open their eyes to scientific career opportunities beyond school, to promote the practice and social benefits of STEAM and not least, to have great fun in the process.

Pupils in Year 9 concluded that the lab experiment had been exciting and had made them more enthusiastic for a career in science in the future and had provided them with a taster of what it will be like if you join a science profession after secondary school.



YEAR 10 MATHS INSPIRATION LECTURES

maths INSPIRATION This week the Science Museum in London hosted the first ever Maths Summit, an unprecedented event bringing together leaders from academia, industry and politics to discuss how the mathematical sciences can better contribute to research, innovation and prosperity. It was reported on the news by Cambridge graduate and now King's College London PhD student Sophie Maclean, and last week Year 10 students experienced their own meeting of mathematical minds at Chelmsford Theatre's Maths Inspiration event also featuring Sophie Maclean.



Maths inspiration comprised Sophie as well as Rob Eastaway and Ben Sparks, presenting talks on the limitations of AI such as ChatGTP when pitted against the human brain's capacity for problem solving and the mathematics that underpins today's most advanced computer graphics.

"From our point of view, the talk was exceptionally interesting, providing insight on the different, creative and practical applications of Maths. The first speaker discussed the progression of artificial intelligence and its efficiency in solving logical puzzles, which it seemed to struggle with. The second speaker spoke about prime numbers and the many laws and subsequent mystery associated with the topic. Finally, the third speaker focussed on involvement of graphs in game design which was also engaging. Overall the experience proved to be beneficial, providing a lot of information on the various topics, and the presenters were exceptionally good speakers, interacting effectively with the audience, entertaining and maintaining attention." 
